




This appliance is supplied with a moulded three pin mains plug for your safety and convenience. A 13 amp fuse is fitted in this plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, please ensure that the replacement fuse has a rating of 13 amps and that it is approved by ASTA or BSI to BS1362.

Check for the ASTA mark P or the BSI mark V on the body of the fuse.

If the plug contains a removable fuse cover, you must ensure that it is refitted when the fuse is replaced. If you lose the fuse cover, the plug must not be used until a replacement cover is obtained. A replacement fuse cover can be purchased from an Authorised Service Center.

If the fitted moulded plug is unsuitable for the mains socket in your home, then the fuse should be removed and the plug cut off and disposed of safely. There is a danger of severe electrical shock if the cut off plug is inserted into any 13 amp socket.

The wall outlet or the circuit breaker shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible when problems occur. If the following problems occur, cut off the power supply immediately.

- Continued use of the projector in these conditions will result in fire or electric shock.

Ask an Authorized Service Center to carry out any repairs to the power cord that might be necessary.

Completely insert the power plug into the wall outlet and the power connector into the projector terminal.

If the plug is not inserted correctly, electric shocks or overheating will result.

• Do not use plugs which are damaged or wall outlets which are coming loose from the wall.

Do not use anything other than the provided power cord.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks or fire. Please note that if you do not use the provided power cord to ground the device on the side of the outlet, this may result in electric shocks.

Clean the power plug regularly to prevent it from becoming covered in dust.

Failure to observe this will cause a fire.

- If dust builds up on the power plug, the resulting humidity can damage the insulation.
- If not using the projector for an extended period of time, pull the power plug out from the wall outlet.

Pull the power plug out from the wall outlet and wipe it with a dry cloth regularly.

Do not handle the power plug and power connector with wet hands.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks.

Do not overload the wall outlet.

If the power supply is overloaded (ex., by using too many adapters), overheating may occur and fire will result.

ON USE/INSTALLATION

Do not place the projector on soft materials such as carpets or sponge mats.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause burns, fire or damage to the projector.

Do not set up the projector in humid or dusty places or in places where the projector may come into contact with oily smoke or steam.

Using the projector under such conditions will result in fire, electric shocks or components deterioration. Components deterioration (such as ceiling mount brackets) may cause the projector which is mounted on the ceiling to fall down.

Do not install this projector in a place which is not strong enough to take the full weight of the projector or on top of a surface which is sloped or unstable.

Failure to observe this will cause projector to fall down or tip over the projector, and severe injury or damage could result.

Installation work (such as ceiling mount bracket) should only be carried out by a qualified technician.

- If installation is not carried out and secured correctly it can cause injury or accidents, such as electric shocks.
 Be sure to use the wire provided with the projector mount bracket for ceiling mount as an extra safety mea-
- sure to prevent the projector from falling down (Install in a different location to the ceiling mount bracket).

Do not install the projector in a location where people pass through.

People may bump into the projector or trip on the power cord, which may result in fire, electric shock, or injury.

Do not cover the air intake/exhaust ports.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause fire or damage to the projector.

- Do not place the projector in narrow, badly ventilated places.
- Do not place the projector on cloth or papers, as these materials could be drawn into the air intake port.
- Provide at least 1 m (39-3/8") of space between any walls or objects and the exhaust port, and at least 50 cm (19-11/16") of space between any walls or objects and the intake port.

WARNING:

Do not place your hands or other objects close to the air exhaust port.

Doing so will cause burns or damage your hands or other objects.

• Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port. Do not place your hands or face, or objects which cannot withstand heat close to this port.

Do not look and place your skin into the lights emitted from the lens while the projector is being used. Doing so can cause burns or loss of sight.

- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens. Do not look or place your hands directly into this light.
- Be especially careful not to let young children look into the lens. In addition, turn off the power and disconnect the power plug when you are away from the projector.

Never attempt to remodel or disassemble the projector.

High voltages can cause fire or electric shocks.

• For any inspection, adjustment and repair work, please contact an Authorized Service Center.

Do not allow metal objects, flammable objects, or liquids to enter inside of the projector. Do not allow the projector to get wet.

Doing so may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in fire, electric shock, or malfunction of the projector.

- Do not place containers of liquid or metal objects near the projector.
- If liquid enters inside of the projector, consult your dealer.
- Particular attention must be paid to children.

Use the ceiling mount bracket specified by Panasonic.

- Using the ceiling mount bracket other than the specified one will result in falling accidents.
- Attach the supplied safety cable to the ceiling mount bracket to prevent the projector from falling down.

Do not touch or remove the rubber cap at the bottom of the projector.

• Doing so will cause burns because the temperature is very high when the lamp is lighting and for a while after the lamp is turned off.

ACCESSORIES

Do not use or handle the batteries improperly, and refer to the following.

Failure to observe this will cause burns, batteries to leak, overheat, explode or catch fire.

- Do not use unspecified batteries.
- Do not charge dry cell batteries.
- Do not disassemble dry cell batteries.
- Do not heat the batteries or place them into water or fire.
- Do not allow the + and terminals of the batteries to come into contact with metallic objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not store or carry batteries together with metallic objects.
- Store the batteries in a plastic bag and keep them away from metallic objects.
- Make sure the polarities (+ and –) are correct when inserting the batteries.
- Do not use a new battery together with an old battery or mix different types of batteries.
- Do not use batteries with the outer cover peeling away or removed.

Do not allow children to reach the batteries and the rubber cap that is removed from the bottom of the projector.

Accidentally swallowing them can cause physical harm.

• If swallowed, seek medical advice immediately.

If the battery fluid leaks, do not touch it with bare hands, and take the following measures if necessary.

- Battery fluid on your skin or clothing could result in skin inflammation or injury.

If the power cord itself is pulled, the lead will become damaged, and fire, short-circuits or serious electric shocks will result.

Disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet before carrying out any cleaning and replacing the unit. Electric shocks can result if this is not done.

ON USE/INSTALLATION

Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

Do not put your weight on this projector.

You could fall or the projector could break, and injury will result.

• Be especially careful not to let young children stand or sit on the projector.

Do not place the projector in extremely hot locations.

Doing so will cause the outer casing or internal components to deteriorate, or result in fire.

• Take particular care in locations exposed to direct sunlight or near stoves.

Do not place the projector where it may be affected by salt or corrosive gas.

Doing so may cause the projector to become faulty due to corrosion.

Do not place objects in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

Do not block the projection by placing an object in front of the projection lens.

Doing so can cause fire or damage to the object and can cause the projector to malfunction.

• Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

Do not stand in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

Doing so can cause damage and burns to clothing.

• Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

Always disconnect all cables before moving the projector.

Moving the projector with cables still attached can damage the cables, which will cause fire or electric shocks to occur.

When mounting the projector on the ceiling, keep mounting screws and power cord from contacting with metal parts inside the ceiling.

Contact with metal parts inside the ceiling can cause electric shocks.

Never plug headphones and earphones into <VARIABLE AUDIO OUT> terminal.

Excessive sound pressure from earphones and headphones can cause hearing loss.

ACCESSORIES

Do not use the old lamp unit.

If used it could cause lamp explosion.

CAUTION:

If the lamp has broken, ventilate the room immediately. Do not touch or bring your face close to the broken pieces.

Failure to observe this will cause the user to absorb the gas which was released when the lamp broke and which contains nearly the same amount of mercury as fluorescent lamps, and the broken pieces will cause injury.

- If you believe that you have absorbed the gas or that the gas has got into your eyes or mouth, seek medical advice immediately.
- Ask your dealer about replacing the lamp unit and check the inside of the projector.

When not using the projector for an extended period of time, remove the batteries from the remote control.

Failure to observe this will cause the batteries to leak, overheat, catch fire or explode, which may result in fire or contamination of surrounding area.


MAINTENANCE

Ask your dealer about cleaning inside the projector once a year.


- Continuous use while dust is accumulated inside the projector may result in fire.



Chapter 1 **Preparation**

This chapter describes things you need to know or check before using the projector.

Precautions for use

Intended use of the product

The product is intended to project still/moving image signals from video equipment and computers onto a screen.

Cautions when transporting

- When transporting the projector, handle it with care and avoid excessive vibration and impacts. Doing so may damage the internal parts and result in malfunctions.
- Do not transport the projector with the adjustable foot extended. Doing so may damage the adjustable foot.
- (Only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355) Do not move or transport the projector with the wireless module (Model No.: ET-WML100) of the optional accessories attached. Doing so may damage the wireless module.

Cautions when installing

Do not set up the projector outdoors.

The projector is designed for indoor use only.

Do not set up the projector in the following locations.

- Places where vibration and impacts occur such as in a car or vehicle: Doing so may cause damage to internal components or malfunction.
- Locations near the sea or areas affected by corrosive gas: Corrosion may damage internal components or cause the projector to malfunction.
- Near the exhaust of an air conditioner: Depending on the conditions of use, the screen may fluctuate in rare cases due to the heated air from the air exhaust port or the hot or cooled air. Make sure that the exhaust from the projector or other equipment, or the air from the air conditioner does not blow toward the front of the projector.
- Places with sharp temperature fluctuations such as near lights (studio lamps): Doing so may shorten the life of the lamp, or result in deformation of the outer case due to heat, which may cause malfunctions.
 Follow the operating environment temperature of the projector.
- Near high-voltage power lines or near motors: Doing so may interfere with the operation of the projector.

Ask a qualified technician or your dealer for the installation work such as installing to a ceiling.

To ensure projector performance and safety, ask a qualified technician or your dealer when installing to a ceiling or in a high place.

Focus adjustment

The projection lens is thermally affected by the light from the light source, making the focus unstable in the period just after switching on the power. It is recommended that the images be projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.

■ When using the projector in the elevation of below 700 m (2 297'), make sure [High land] is set to [Off].

Failure to do so may shorten the life of the internal parts and result in malfunctions.

■ When using the projector in the elevation of above 700 m (2 297') and below 1 400 m (4 593'), make sure [High land] is set to [On 1].

Failure to do so may shorten the life of the internal parts and result in malfunctions.

■ When using the projector in the elevation of above 1 400 m (4 593') and below 2 700 m (8 858'), make sure [High land] is set to [On 2].

Failure to do so may shorten the life of the internal parts and result in malfunctions.

Do not install the projector at elevations of 2 700 m (8 858') or higher above sea level.


Failure to do so may shorten the life of the internal parts and result in malfunctions.

Do not tilt the projector or place it on its side.

Do not tilt the projector body more than approximately ± 30 degrees vertically or ± 15 degrees horizontally. Over tilting may result in shortening the life of the components.

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
For PT-LB305, keystone correction in the horizontal direction is not supported. If the projector is tilted horizontally, horizontal trapezoidal distortion cannot be corrected.



Cautions when setting the projectors


- Use the adjustable foot only for adjusting the angle. Using them for other purposes may damage the projector.
- When installing the projector with a method other than the floor installation or the ceiling installation using the ceiling mount bracket, use the four screw holes for ceiling mount (as shown in the figure) to fix the projector.
 In such case, make sure that there is no clearance between the screw holes for ceiling mount on the projector bottom and
- the setting surface by inserting spacers (metallic) between them.
- Use a torque screwdriver or Allen torque wrench to tighten the fixing screws to their specified tightening torques. Do not use electric screwdrivers or impact screwdrivers.

(Screw diameter: M4, tapping depth inside the projector: 10 mm (13/32"), screw tightening torque: 1.25 ± 0.2 N·m)



Positions of screw holes for ceiling mount and adjustable foot

- Do not stack the projectors.
- Do not use the projector supporting it by the top.
- Do not block the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.
- Avoid heating and cooling air from the air conditioning system directly blow to the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.



- Do not install the projector in a confined space.
 When placing the projector in a confined space, a ventilation and/or air conditioning system is required. Exhaust heat may accumulate when the ventilation is not enough, triggering the protection circuit of the projector.
- Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage to the product caused by an inappropriate choice of location for installing the projector, even if the warranty period of the product has not expired.

Security

Take safety measures against following incidents.

- Personal information being leaked via this product.
- Unauthorized operation of this product by a malicious third party.
- Interfering or stopping of this product by a malicious third party.

Take sufficient security measures.

- Make your password as difficult to guess as possible.
- Change your password periodically. The password can be set in [Expand] menu → [Security] → [PIN code change].
- Panasonic or its affiliate company never inquires a password directly to a customer. Do not tell your password in case you receive such an inquiry.
- The connecting network must be secured by firewall or others.
- Set a password for web control and restrict the users who can log in. A password for the web control can be set in the [General Setup] page of the web control screen.

Security when using the wireless LAN product

(Only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355)

The advantage of a wireless LAN is that information can be exchanged between a computer or other such equipment and a wireless access point using radio waves, instead of using a LAN cable, as long as you are within range for radio transmissions. On the other hand, because the radio wave can travel through an obstacle (such as a wall) and is accessible from anywhere within a given range, following problems may occur if security setting is insufficient.

- Transmitted data may be intercepted
 - A malicious third party may intentionally intercept radio waves and monitor the following transmitted data.
 - Personal information such as your ID, password, credit card number
 - Content of an Email
- Illegally accessed

A malicious third party may access your personal or corporate network without authorization and engage in the following types of behavior.

- Retrieve personal and/or secret information (information leak)
- Spread false information by impersonating a particular person (spoofing)
- Overwrite intercepted communications and issue false data (tampering)
- Spread harmful software such as a computer virus and crash your data and/or system (system crash)

Since most wireless LAN adapters or access points are equipped with security features to take care of these problems, you can reduce the possibility of these problems occurring when using this product by making the appropriate security settings for the wireless LAN device.

Some wireless LAN devices may not be set for security immediately after purchase. To decrease the possibility of occurrence of security problems, be sure to make all security related settings according to the operation instructions supplied with each wireless LAN device before using a wireless LAN device.

Depending on the specifications of the wireless LAN, a malicious third party may be able to break security settings by special means.

Panasonic asks customers to thoroughly understand the risk of using this product without making security settings, and recommends that the customers make security settings at their own discretion and responsibility.

Notes on Using Wireless Connection

(Only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355)

Wireless connection function of the projector uses radio waves in the 2.4 GHz band.

A radio station license is not required, but be sure to read and fully understand the following items before use.

The wireless module (Model No.: ET-WML100) of optional accessories must be installed when you want to use the wireless LAN function of this projector.

Do not use near other wireless equipment.

The following equipment may use radio waves in the same band as the projector.

When the projector is used near these devices, radio wave interference may make communication impossible, or the

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communication speed may become slower.

- Microwave ovens, etc.
- Industrial, chemical and medical equipment, etc.
- In-plant radio stations for identifying moving objects such as those used in factory manufacturing lines, etc.
- Designated low-power radio stations

If at all possible, avoid the use of cell phones, TV sets or radios near the projector.

Cell phones, TV sets, radios and similar devices use different radio bands from the projector, so there is no effect on wireless communication or the transmission and reception of these devices. However, radio waves from the projector may produce audio or video noise.

Wireless communication radio waves cannot penetrate steel reinforcements, metal, concrete, etc.

Communication is possible through walls and floors made from materials such as wood and glass (except glass containing wire mesh), but not through walls and floors made from steel reinforcements, metal, concrete, etc.

Do not use the projector as much as possible in a location where static electricity is generated.

The communication via wireless LAN or wired LAN may be prone to disruption when the projector is used in a location where static electricity or noise is generated.

There is a rare case that the LAN connection may not be established due to static electricity or noise, so in such case, turn off the projector, remove the source of problematic static electricity or noise, and turn the projector back on.

Using the projector outside the country

Note that depending on countries or regions there are restrictions on the channels and frequencies at which you can use the wireless LAN.

Multi Monitoring & Control Software

This application software monitors and controls the multiple display devices (projector and flat panel display) connected to an intranet.

• Early Warning Software

This plug-in software monitors the status of the display devices and their peripherals within an intranet, and notifies of abnormality of such equipment and detects the signs of possible abnormality. "Early Warning Software" is preinstalled in the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software". To use the early warning function of this plug-in software, install "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" in the PC to be used. By enabling the early warning function, it will notify of the approximate time to replace the consumables for the display devices, to clean each part of the display devices, and to replace the components of the display devices, allowing to execute maintenance in advance.

The early warning function can be used by registering maximum of 2048 display devices free of charge for 90 days after installing the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" into a PC. To continuously use after the 90 days, it is necessary to purchase the license of "Early Warning Software" (ET-SWA100 Series) and perform the activation. Also, depending on the type of license, the number of display devices that can be registered for monitoring varies. For details, refer to the Operating Instructions of "Multi Monitoring & Control Software".

Presenter Light Software

This application software compatible with Windows computers transmits the computer screen to the projector via wireless LAN or wired LAN.

Wireless Projector

This application software for iOS/Android is used to project files such as PDF or image by transmitting to the projector via wireless LAN.

Storage

When storing the projector, keep it in a dry room.

Disposal

When disposing of the product, ask your local authority or dealer about the correct methods of disposal.

The lamp contains mercury. When disposing of the used lamp unit, ask your nearest local authorities or dealer about proper disposal of the unit.

Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions or your local disposal rule or guidelines.

Cautions on use

To get a good picture quality

In order to view a beautiful image in higher contrast, prepare an appropriate environment. Draw curtains or blinds over windows and turn off any lights near the screen to prevent outside light or light from indoor lamps from shining onto the screen.

Projection lens

• Do not touch the surface of the projector lens with your bare hand.

If the surface of the lens becomes dirty from fingerprints or anything else, this will be magnified and projected onto the screen.

Do not wipe the lens during operation.
 Cleaning the lens during operation may cause foreign objects adhering to the lens or bring damage to the lens surface.

LCD Panel

Indicated on the projector

The display unit of this projector comprises three LCD panels. Although an LCD panel is a product of high-precision technology, some of the pixels on the projected image may be missing or constantly lit. Please note that this is not a malfunction.

Displaying a still image for a longer time may result in an after-image on the LCD panels. If this happens, display the all white screen in the Test pattern for an hour or more.

Optical components

Operating the projector in an environment with high temperature or heavy exposure to dust or tobacco smoke will reduce the service life of the optical components, such as the LCD panel and polarizing plate, and may necessitate their replacement within less than one year of use. For details, consult your dealer.

Lamp

The luminous source of the projector is a mercury lamp with high internal pressure.

A high pressure mercury lamp has following characteristics.


- The brightness of the lamp will decrease by duration of usage.
- The lamp may burst with sound or shorten life by shock or chipping.
- The life of the lamp varies greatly depending on individual specificities and usage conditions. In particular, continuous use over 6 hours and frequent on/off switching of the power greatly deteriorate the lamp and affect the lamp life.
- In rare cases, the lamp burst shortly after the projection.
- The risk of bursting increases when the lamp is used beyond its replacement cycle. Make sure to replace the lamp unit consistently. ("When to replace the lamp unit" (➡ page 101), "Replacing the lamp unit" (➡ page 102))
- If the lamp bursts, gas contained inside of the lamp is released in a form of smoke.
- It is recommended to store replacement lamps for contingency.

Computer and external device connections

When connecting a computer or an external device, read this manual carefully regarding the use of power cords and shielded cables as well.

Accessories

Make sure the following accessories are provided with your projector. Numbers enclosed < > show the number of accessories.



- After unpacking the projector, discard the power cord cap and packaging material properly.
- Do not use the supplied power cord for devices other than this projector.
- For lost accessories, consult your dealer.



Connecting

Before connecting

- Before connecting, carefully read the operating instructions for the external device to be connected.
- Turn off the power switch of the devices before connecting cables.
- Take note of the following points before connecting the cables. Failure to do so may result in malfunctions.
- When connecting a cable to a device connected to the projector or the projector itself, touch any nearby metallic objects to eliminate static electricity from your body before performing work.
- Do not use unnecessarily long cables to connect to a device connected to the projector or to the projector body. The longer the cable, the more it is susceptible to noise. Since using a cable while it is wound makes it act like an antenna, it is more susceptible to noise.
- When connecting cables, connect GND first, then insert the connecting terminal of the connecting device in a straight manner.
- If any connection cable is not supplied with the device, or if no optional cable is available for connection of the device, prepare a necessary system connection cable to suit the device.
- Video signals containing too much jitter may cause the images on the screen to randomly wobble or wafture. In this case, a time base corrector (TBC) must be connected.
- The projector accepts Video signals, Y/C signals and YC_BC_R/YP_BP_R signals and analog RGB signals (synchronous signals are TTL level), and digital signal.
- Some computer models or graphics cards are not compatible with the projector.
- When using long cables to connect with each of equipment to the projector, there is a possibility that the image will not be output correctly unless a compensator is used.
- For details on what video signals the projector supports, see "List of compatible signals". (➡ page 110)





 - A time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the VCR.



• When connecting the projector to a computer or an external device, use the power cord supplied with each device and commercially available shielded cables.

Note

- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be projected.
- If you operate the projector using the computer with the resume feature (last memory), you may have to reset the resume feature to operate the projector.
- When the <VARIABLE AUDIO OUT> terminal is connected with cable, the sound will not be output from the built-in speaker.
 Attach the optional wireless module (Model No.: ET-WML100) or USB memory directly to the <USB A (VIEWER/
- WIRELESS)> terminal of this projector without using a USB extension cable or USB hub.
- If the video signal from the DVI-D terminal of the external device (such as a computer) is connected to the <HDMI IN> terminal by using a conversion cable, you need to set the [Setting] menu → [HDMI setup] → [Sound] to [Computer] (→ page 64) and input the audio signal to the <AUDIO IN 1> terminal.

Chapter 3 Basic Operations

This chapter describes basic operations to start with.

Powering on/off


Connecting the power cord

Make sure that the supplied power cord is securely fixed to the <AC IN> terminal of the projector body to prevent it from being removed easily.

For details of power cord handling, refer to "Read this first!" (→ page 4).

Attaching

1) Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal on the back of the projector body and the power cord connector and insert the connector completely in the correct direction.




Removing

- 1) Confirm that the projector is in standby mode, and remove the power plug from the outlet.
- 2) Remove the power cord connector from the <AC IN> terminal.

Power indicator

The power indicator $\langle ON(G)/STANDBY(R) \rangle$ informs you the status of the power. Confirm the status of the power indicator $\langle ON(G)/STANDBY(R) \rangle$ before operating the projector.



Powering On the Projector


Before switching on the projector, make sure all the other devices are correctly connected. (> page 34)



- 1) Connect the power cord to the projector body.
- 2) Connect the power plug to an outlet.
 - The power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in red, and the projector will enter the standby mode.
- 3) Press the power $< \oplus / | >$ button.
 - The power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in green and the image is soon projected on the screen.

Making adjustments and selections

It is recommended that images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.




- 1) Roughly adjust the focus of the image with the focus ring. (+ page 43)
- 2) Change the settings of the [Display] menu → [Project way] depending on the installation mode.
 (⇒ page 56)

Refer to "Navigating through the menu" (→ page 51) for the operation of the menu screen.

- Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the input selection (<COMPUTER 1>, <COMPUTER 2>, <HDMI>, <VIDEO>, <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY/NETWORK>) buttons on the remote control to select the input signal.
 - The <COMPUTER 2> button is only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355, it is disabled for PT-LB305.
 - The <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY/NETWORK> button is only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355. The <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY> button is for PT-LB305 and it is disabled.
- 4) Adjust the projection angle of the projector with the adjustable foot. (→ page 44)
- 5) If the input signal is an analog RGB signal, press the <AUTO SETUP> button.
- 6) Adjust the size of the image to match the screen with the zoom ring.
- 7) Adjust the focus with the focus ring again.
- 8) Adjust the size of the image to match the screen with the zoom ring again.

Powering Off the Projector



1) Press the power $< \oplus / | >$ button.

• The power-off confirmation screen is displayed.

- 2) Press the power <⊕/ |> button again.
 Projection of the image will stop, and the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> blinks in red. (The fan keeps running.)
- Wait until the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in red.
 The projector enters standby mode when the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in red.

4) Disconnect the plug of the power cord from the outlet.

Note


- While the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> is blinking in red, the lamp is being cooled down and the projector cannot be turned on. Wait until the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in red to turn on the projector again.
- When packing the projector for transportation and storage, please make sure that the power indicator is off.
- Even if the power is turned off by pressing the power <0/1> button, the projector consumes power if the power plug is connected to the outlet.

When the [Setting] menu \rightarrow [Standby mode] is set to [Eco], use of some functions is restricted, but the power consumption during standby mode can be conserved.

Projecting

Check the connections of the peripheral devices (\Rightarrow page 34) and connection of the power cord (\Rightarrow page 39) and switch on the power (\Rightarrow page 40) to start the projector. Select the image and adjust the state of the image.

Selecting the input signal



The input for projection can be switched. Method to switch the input is as follows.

- · Press the input selection buttons on the remote control and directly specify the input to project.
- Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel to display the input selection screen and select the input to project from the list.

When using the remote control

The input for projection can be switched directly by pressing the input selection button on the remote control.

- 1) Press the input selection (<COMPUTER 1>, <COMPUTER 2>, <HDMI>, <VIDEO>, <MEMORY VIEWER/ USB DISPLAY/NETWORK>) buttons.
 - The <COMPUTER 2> button is only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355, it is disabled for PT-LB305.
 - The <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY/NETWORK> button is only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355. The <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY> button is for PT-LB305 and it is disabled.

- Images may not be projected properly depending on the connected device and DVD, video tape, etc. to be played. Select a system format that is suitable for the input signal in [Display] menu → [System] (→ page 57).
- Check the aspect ratio of the screen and the image and select the optimum aspect ratio under the [Display] menu → [Aspect] (→ page 56).

Note

- If the Memory Viewer input is selected, the still image stored in the USB memory can be projected using the Memory Viewer function. For details, please refer to "About Memory Viewer function" (

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When using the control panel

The input for projection can be selected by displaying the input screen with the control panel.

1) Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button.

• The Input screen is displayed.



- 2) Press $\blacktriangle \forall$ to select one item and then press the <ENTER> button.
 - The selected input signal will be projected.

How to adjust the state of the image


If the projected image or the position is not correct when the positioning of the projector and the screen is correctly installed, adjust the focus, projection angle and zoom.

1) Adjust the projection angle.

- Place the projector on a level surface so that the projected image does not tilt to the left or right.
- If the projected image is located below the screen, extend the adjustable foot to adjust the position of projected image.
 For details, see "Adjusting adjustable foot" (➡ page 44).
- Adjust from the [Expand] menu → [Keystone] (→ page 66) when the projected image is distorted.

2) Adjust the zoom and the focus.

- Rotate the zoom ring to adjust the projected image size to fit the screen.
- Rotate the focus ring to adjust the focus of the projected image.



Note


- It is recommended that the images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.
- When the focus is adjusted, the projection screen size also changes slightly. Depending on the image projection situation, repeat Steps 1) and 2) to adjust to the best projection condition.

Adjusting adjustable foot

By pressing the adjustable foot lock with your finger, the adjustable foot lock is released and becomes free. It will be locked when you release the finger. Lift the front side of the projector while pressing the adjustable foot lock with your finger, and release your finger until the projection position is aligned.

For slight adjustment, rotate the adjustable foot.

Rotate the adjustable foot to extend it as shown in the figure, and rotate it in the opposite direction to contract it.




Maximum adjustable range Adjustable foot : 40 mm (1-9/16")

Attention

- Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port while the lamp is lit. Do not touch the air exhaust port directly when you adjust the adjustable foot.
- Adjust from the [Expand] menu → [Keystone] (→ page 66) when the projected image is distorted.

Basic operations by using the remote control



Performing automatic setup

The Input search function, Auto PC adjustment function and Auto Keystone correction function can be performed simultaneously.

Input search is a function to automatically detect the input signal and switch the input.

The Auto PC adjustment function can be used to automatically adjust the clock phase, image position (horizontal / vertical) and dot clock when the still image analog RGB signal is input. (Analog RGB signal is a signal structured with dots just like the computer signal.)

The Auto Keystone correction function automatically corrects vertical trapezoidal distortion.

It is recommended to input an image with bright white borders at the edges and high-contrast black and white characters when the Auto PC adjustment function is being performed. Avoid using images that include halftones or gradation, such as photographs and computer graphics.



button

1) Press the <AUTO SETUP> button on the remote control.

Note

- For settings of the functions to be performed during automatic setup execution, refer to the [Expand] menu → [Auto setup]
 (⇒ page 65).
- It may not be correctly adjusted even when the Auto PC adjustment function is performed. In such a case, adjust the following settings.
 - For clock phase: [Display] menu \rightarrow [Fine sync] (\Rightarrow page 55)
 - For horizontal image position: [Display] menu \rightarrow [H Position] (\Rightarrow page 55)
 - For vertical image position: [Display] menu \rightarrow [V Position] (\blacklozenge page 56)
- For dot clock: [Display] menu \rightarrow [H.Size] (\Rightarrow page 56)
- If trapezoidal distortion remains, you can make adjustment by using the screen adjustment function. For details, refer to "Using the screen adjustment function" (+ page 46).
- You can also adjust it by using [Expand] menu \rightarrow [Keystone] (\Rightarrow page 66).
- It may not be adjusted correctly depending on the computer model and the input signal.







Chapter 5 **Operation of Function**

This chapter describes the operation methods of some functions.

About Memory Viewer function

(Only for PT-LW375, PT-LW335, PT-LB425, PT-LB385 and PT-LB355)

The Memory Viewer function makes it possible to display the still images stored in the USB memory as projected images.

What you can project with the Memory Viewer function

Memory Viewer function supports the following image files.

Note

- File size that can be played back is 2 GB at the maximum.
- The total number of folders/files that can be recognized on the projector is 500 at the maximum.
- Files protected by DRM (Digital Rights Management) cannot be played back.
- It maybe impossible to play even if the file is recorded in the supported format.

Cautions on using USB Memory

Please observe the following.

- Do not put USB memory or its cap within close reach of children. Swallowing them may cause suffocation.
- If the smoke or questionable odor rise, remove the USB memory from the projector, and then contact your dealer.
- Do not put water, chemical or oil to the USB memory. It may cause short out or fire.
- Do not put foreign objects or put metal objects to the USB terminal. It may cause data loss or data corruption.
- Do not remove the USB memory from the projector while data is being read from the USB memory. It may cause data loss or data corruption.
- Do not leave the USB memory in a place with high humidity or dust.
- Do not leave the USB memory in a place where static electricity or electromagnetic radiation is generated.

Note

- It is compatible with the USB memory sold in the market.
- It cannot be used the other format other than the formatted with FAT16 and FAT32.

Attaching the USB memory

1) Attach the USB memory firmly into the <USB A (VIEWER/WIRELESS)> terminal.

Attention

- Pay attention to the terminal direction to avoid damaging the terminal when attaching the USB memory.
- Attach the USB memory directly into the <USB A (VIEWER/WIRELESS)> terminal of the projector. Do not use a USB extension cable or USB hub.

Removing the USB memory

1) Make sure that the indicator on the USB memory is not flashing, and remove it.

Attention

- Please note following points when removing the USB memory.
- When the indicator of the USB memory attached to the projector is blinking, it indicates that the projector is reading the USB memory. Do not remove the USB memory from the projector while the indicator is blinking.
- When using a USB memory that does not have a monitor function such as an indicator, you cannot check the access status to the USB memory. In this case, remove it from the projector after closing the memory viewer function or turning off the projector.
- Do not attach and detach the USB memory in a short time. Wait at least 5 seconds after attaching and then remove the USB memory. If you want to reattach it, wait at least 5 seconds after removal. It takes about 5 seconds for the projector to recognize the USB memory.

Displaying the Memory Viewer screen

- 1) Press the <MEMORY VIEWER/USB DISPLAY/NETWORK> button on the remote control to switch the input source to Memory Viewer.
 - You can also press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel and select the input source in the Input menu.
- 2) Attach the USB memory directly into the <USB A (VIEWER/WIRELESS)> terminal.
 - The standby screen "please press RC ENTER" is displayed while the USB memory icon is displayed at the lower left of the screen.
- 3) Press the <ENTER> button on the remote control.

• The root directory of the USB memory will be displayed in thumbnail on the screen.

Playing the pictures

1) Press ▲▼◀▶ on the remote control to select a file you want to play on the memory viewer screen.

2) Press the <ENTER> button on the remote control.


This chapter describes methods of inspection when there are problems, maintenance, and replacement of the units.

Power/Warning Indicators

If a problem should occur inside the projector, the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> and the warning indicator <WARNING> will inform you by lighting or blinking. Check the status of the indicators and remedy the indicated problems as follows.

Attention

• Before you take a remedial measure, follow the procedure of switching the power off indicated in "Powering Off the Projector" (➡ page 41).

Maintenance/replacement

Before performing maintenance/replacement

- When you perform maintenance or replacement of the parts, make sure to turn off the power and disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet. (
 page 41)
- Be sure to observe the procedure "Powering Off the Projector" (⇒ page 41) when performing power supply operation.

Maintenance

Outer Case

Wipe off dirt and dust using a soft dry cloth.

- If the dirt is persistent, soak the cloth with water and wring it thoroughly before wiping. Dry off the projector with a dry cloth.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or rubbing alcohol, other solvents, household cleaners. Using them may cause deterioration of the outer case.
- When using chemical treated dusters, follow its instruction.

Front glass surface of the lens

Wipe off the dirt and dust off the front surface of the lens with soft clean cloth.

- Do not use a cloth that has an abrasive surface or a cloth that is moist, oily, or covered with dust.
- Do not use excessive force when wiping the lens as it is fragile.
- Do not use benzene, thinner or rubbing alcohol, other solvents or household cleaners. Using them may cause deterioration of the lens.

Attention

• The lens may be damaged if you hit with a hard object or wipe with excessive force. Please handle with care.



DO NOT WIPE THE LENS DURING OPERATION.

Cleaning the lens during operation may cause foreign objects adhering to the lens or bring damage to the lens surface.

Air filter unit

Perform maintenance of the air filter in the following cases.

- If the time which is set in [Expand] menu → [Filter counter] is elapsed, the filter warning icon Filter warning will be displayed.
- If the air filter is clogged with dust, the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> blinks in orange, or the filter warning icon
 Filter warning
 will be displayed and after a while the projector is turned off automatically.

Attention

- Make sure to turn off the power before performing maintenance on the air filter unit.
- Make sure that the projector is stable, and perform the maintenance in a safe place where the unit will not be damaged even if you drop the air filter unit.

Removing the air filter unit



1) Remove the air filter cover. (Fig.1)

• Pull out the air filter cover from the hook of the projector while slightly pushing upward the tabs of the air filter cover and open it in the direction of the arrow in figure.

2) Remove the air filter unit.

- The air filter unit is fixed by the three hooks. Grasp the fibre of the air filter unit near to the cover side with one hook and then pull the air filter unit out from the air filter cover as arrow direction shown. (Fig.2)
- After removing the air filter unit, remove foreign objects and dust from the air filter compartment and the projector's air intake port if there are any.

Cleaning the air filter unit

Remove the air filter unit beforehand according to the previously described procedure in "Removing the air filter unit".

1) Clean the air filter unit.


- Vacuum dirt and dust from the air filter unit.
- Do not wash the air filter unit.




Attaching the air filter unit

1) Attach the new air filter unit to the air filter cover.

• There is a distinction between the inside and outside of the air filter unit. Align the red mark on the air filter unit with the red mark on the air filter cover.



• Insert the air filter unit to the side with the two hooks and then press the other side of the air filter unit into the cover side with one hook.



2) Attach the air filter cover to the projector.

- Perform Step 1) in "Removing the air filter unit" (> page 99) in the reverse order.
- Make sure that the air filter cover is closed tightly.

Resetting the filter counter

Be sure to reset the filter counter after cleaning the air filter unit.

- 1) Connect the power plug, press the power $\langle 0/| \rangle$ button.
- 2) Press the <MENU> button to display the main menu, then press ▲▼ to select [Expand].
- 3) Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the <ENTER> button on the remote control, then press ▲▼ to select [Filter counter].
- Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the <ENTER> button on the remote control, then press ▲▼ to select [Filter counter reset].
- 5) Press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the <ENTER> button on the remote control.
 The [Filter counter reset ?] confirmation message is displayed.
- 6) Press ▲▼ to select [Yes], then press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the <ENTER> button on the remote control.

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- The [OK?] screen is displayed.
- 7) Press ▲▼ to select [Yes], then press the <INPUT/ENTER> button on the control panel or the <ENTER> button on the remote control.
 - The filter counter is reset and the filter usage time becomes 0 hour.

Attention

- Do not disassemble the air filter unit.
- When attaching the air filter unit, make sure that the projector is stable, and work in an environment that is safe, even in the event of the air filter unit dropping.
- Make sure that the air filter unit is properly attached before using the projector. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust causing a malfunction.

Note

- After cleaning the air filter, reset the filter counter. Otherwise, the actual filter usage time cannot be confirmed.
- Replace the air filter unit with the new optional Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFL300) if it is damaged or if the dirt does not come off even after cleaning.

Replacing the unit

Lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component. Refer to "When to replace the lamp unit" for details about the replacement cycle. When purchasing the optional Replacement Lamp Unit (Model No.: ET-LAL510), consult your dealer.

Warning

Do not replace the lamp unit when it is hot. (Wait at least one hour after use.) The inside of the cover can become very hot, take care to avoid burn injuries.

Notes on the replacement of the lamp unit

- A Phillips screwdriver is necessary when replacing the lamp unit.
- Since the luminous lamp is made of glass, it may burst if dropped or hit with a hard object. Handle with care.
- Do not disassemble or modify the lamp unit.
- When replacing the lamp unit, be sure to hold it by the handle because its surface is pointed and its shape is protruded.
- The lamp may rapture. Replace the lamp unit carefully so the glass fragments of the lamp do not scatter. While attaching the projector to the ceiling, do not work right under the lamp unit or do not conduct work while your face is near the lamp unit.
- The lamp contains mercury. When disposing of used lamp units, contact your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal.

Attention

 Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage or malfunction of the product resulting from use of lamp units which are not manufactured by Panasonic. Use only specified lamp units.

Note

The model numbers of accessories and optional accessories are subject to change without prior notice.

When to replace the lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component. Since its brightness gradually decreases over time, it is necessary to replace the lamp unit regularly.

Please refer to the displayed time in [Lamp counter] of [Info.] about the usage time of lamp (
page 80).

The estimated duration before replacement is 20 000 hours which is displayed in [Lamp counter], but the lamp may go off before the time above mentioned has elapsed depending on individual lamp characteristics, usage conditions, and the installation environment. It is recommended that the Replacement lamp unit be prepared earlier.

The time which is displayed in [Lamp counter] is a total time when the real usage time in [\bigcirc (Normal)], [\bigcirc (Eco)] or [\bigcirc (Quiet)] is converted to the runtime in [\bigcirc (Eco)]. Please note that they are not displayed individually.

The displayed time in [Lamp counter] = "Lamp runtime of [🜳 (Normal)]" × 2 + "Lamp runtime of [🧇 (Eco)]"

+ "Lamp runtime of [🧼 (Quiet)]" × 2





Attention

- When the projector is mounted on a ceiling, do not work with your face close to the projector.
- Do not remove or loosen the screws other than specified ones when replacing the lamp unit.
- Make sure to attach the lamp unit and the lamp cover securely.



1) Turn off the power by following the procedure in "Powering Off the Projector" (⇒ page 41). Remove the AC power plug from the wall outlet.

• Wait at least one hour and make sure the lamp unit and surroundings are cool.

- 2) Use a Phillips screwdriver to loosen the lamp cover fixing screw (×1) until it turns freely and remove the lamp cover.
 - Remove the lamp cover by pulling it slowly toward the direction of the arrow as the above figure shown.
- 3) Use a Phillips screwdriver to loosen the three lamp unit fixing screws (×3) until they turn freely.
- 4) Hold the used lamp unit by its handles, and pull it gently from the projector.
- 5) Insert the new lamp unit in correct direction. Tighten the three lamp unit fixing screws (×3) securely with a Phillips screwdriver.
 - When you experience difficulty in installing the lamp unit, remove it and try again. If you use force to install the lamp unit, the connector may be damaged.

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- 6) Attach the lamp cover. Tighten the lamp cover fixing screw (×1) securely with a Phillips screwdriver.






